President Ross greeted convention attendees as missionaries. Three thousand LWMLers will meet in conventions this weekend. Forty conventions will be held this spring and summer. Karen Duprey and Amy Gill were recognized for their service to National LWML.

News from LWMLS included the establishment of the LWML Doctoral Study Area at Fort Wayne Seminary by an anonymous donor. LWML will be

recognized at the LCMS convention in July for its work with Lutheran Friends of the Deaf to fund Bible Story Books for use by the deaf.

Items from the LWML Store provide resources and products for our use; visibility about LWML; and an esprit de corps expressing what LWML stands for, who we work for, and why.
